Dear Friends in Christ,

It is now officially autumn. The colors are beginning to warm up into yellows, oranges, and reds----a final hurrah before they drop. (A bit like the Rally Day that often happens with patients on hospice when they have a day of energy and joy in their last weeks of life). It is the season of change. As I reflect on the teachings of Jesus, and how our worship follows a seasonal calendar, we get many opportunities to name our losses, explore our griefs, and learn how to die in many different ways in our lives.

Each Sunday, we pray for the saints above, those who have died in the faith and are now gone from our sight. This is the last petition of the prayers of the people, each and every Sunday during worship. Someone we know is dying, or has died, and we are re-membering them. Sometimes, the dying/loss is not a person. It could be a change where we have had a new diagnosis or a drastic change in health, and now we need to measure our energy to decide what is possible for the day. Other times, it could be the death of a relationship.... a friendship that has been important for a time, and now is no longer possible. Maybe, we are experiencing changes, losses, in our church community, with a new pastor or maybe our congregation is beginning steps towards a closing a building.

In all of these changes, Jesus says over and over to us:

I love you. Fear not. I am with you. I will weep alongside of you. I will sigh with you. I will catch your tears in a bottle.

So the song below is playing in my heart, as I reflect on losses and changes. I wonder how Jesus will help us let go of our losses. This is not about forgetting, this is about the process of grieving. Where could we see evidence of resurrection? Where do we need to weep? Will we allow ourselves to let go or we will stuff our feelings, and fears? Jesus goes with us through our Fridays, and Sunday, Easter Resurrection, is always ahead. May we hold with hope! 

Mental Health and the Holiday Season:

Finding Calm in the Chaos

As September ends and October begins, we start to approach what many experience as a loud, hectic season—Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's. For some, this season is full of joy, but for others, it brings stress, anxiety, and even loneliness. (And for those living above the southern states, the cold winds and snow are also on their way.) It can feel as though we are leaving the quieter part of the year and heading straight into the noisiest, both audibly and visually. October kicks off the holiday season with Halloween, quickly followed by Thanksgiving and, for some, the chaos of Black Friday shopping. Everything culminates with Christmas and New Year's celebrations.

During this time, we are bombarded by decorations, bright lights, sounds, music, and social obligations. While some people are surrounded by family and friends, others may feel isolated due to the absence or distance of loved ones. Adding to this, daylight grows shorter with each passing day, sometimes intensifying feelings of stress and frustration.

The pressure to create the "perfect" holiday experience for ourselves and others can feel overwhelming. It is important to remember that you are not alone in feeling this way. Many people struggle with mental health triggers during this time of year. To help, I have compiled some articles and resources that offer helpful ways to cope:



THOUGHTS FROM BARRIE'S HOUSE.

As the ELCA, we talk about doing God's Work with Our Hands. Being there for our Community when they show up on Thursdays is God's work. Doing God's work gives some glimpses of the face of God. Here are a few examples:

• A man who was in tears because I asked him if he wanted cookies. He said he had never had to get help to feed his family and was so happy to get some basic food. He looked at me and said "You mean to tell me you have cookies for us?" Our cookies made him feel loved. Isn't this a lesson many of us learned from our Grandmothers?

• A call from a nearby local church that had to close their doors, asking if they could give us a freezer. They followed this up by our

many other things they wanted us to be able to use. Then they sent an amazingly generous unexpected check saying "please use this to further your mission of helping others". Through the years they have been generous to us and as they closed their doors and liquidated their assets they gave to Barrie's House. They were sad and hurting and grieving and chose to give. What an incredible example to us and our whole community.

• The smiles on so many faces as they enjoy their take-out lunch and say "This is so good!"

• A sweet woman who, on her first visit to Barrie's House, asked me my name and asked if we ever needed any volunteers. Sometimes the "gift" we give is letting others give.

• Seeing the creative energy and love poured into Christmas gifts for kids as they are lovingly gathered and packaged on a hot September afternoon. I believe God's work can be evidenced in a book about animal poop.

• Understanding from our task force that it is a priority for the work of Barrie's House to continue. We don't know what that will look like but I find it helpful to remind myself that it is <u>God's</u> Work. We need to let Him do some of it! I'll buy eggs and set up tables and make copies and think about where to fit a freezer. My hands and the hands of so many others get the sacred privilege of doing God's Work. If we are paying attention, we also get to see the face of God in each other.

In closing, I ask for the prayers of all in the Alliance as we dream and plan and listen and wait and move forward in the ministries of Barrie's House. May we not let grief and frustration get in the way of giving to and meeting the needs of our neighbors.
